
# A Prayer for Pregnant Mothers

- On March 25, 2020, the Church celebrated the 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the papal encyclical *Evangelium* vitae (The Gospel of Life).
- Written by Pope St. John Paul II, this prophetic document reaffirmed the Church's constant teaching on the value of every human life.



- In honor of this anniversary, the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops
   Committee on Pro-Life Activities is inviting parishes, through the support of
   their bishops and pastors, to join a nationwide effort entitled: "Walking
   with Moms in Need."
- Walking with Moms in Need is a process in which Catholic parishes and communities "walk in the shoes" of local pregnant and parenting women in need.



- Everyone should know how to help moms in difficult circumstances.
- While I'm not trying to turn Catholic parishes into pregnancy centers, we can identify and share local resources with pregnant and parenting women. And where there are few local resources, we can create our own, based on the gifts of the parish community! (special collections, Knights of Columbus, etc.)



- We know that pregnant and parenting moms in need are already in our parishes, our schools, or Rel Ed programs, in our pews, and our neighborhoods, but in desperation, they may be turning to other places for help.
- As Pope Francis reminds us, our parishes need to be "islands of mercy in the midst of a sea of indifference."
- This initiative is asking our parish to become an "island of mercy."



- Women facing challenging pregnancies should see the Church as a place where they can find help. It should be the first place they go.
- We need to honestly assess the pastoral and practical assistance that we currently provide to pregnant moms and families in need. How effective are we in communicating such help?
- The U.S. bishops are providing educational, pastoral, and action-oriented resources to help us answer these questions and go to the peripheries and bring hope and help to mothers in need.

In the Gospel of Life, St. John Paul II challenged us:

"With great openness and courage, we need to question how widespread is the culture of life today among individual Christians, families, groups and communities in our Dioceses. With equal clarity and determination, we must identify the steps we are called to take in order to serve life in all its truth." (EV 95)

# Nebraska Statistical Report of Abortions 2021

- 2,360 in 2021; 2378 in 2020
- 26 is age at which abortions occurred most frequently
   96.0 abortions per 1,000 live births
- 1,655 (70.2%) were first abortions
- 1,410 (60%) already had at least one live birth before abortion
- 1,709 (72.4%) were chemical abortions

#### **Testing Services**

- Under Dr. Nick Steinaur's medical license and provided by licensed, trained nurses
- Medical-grade urine pregnancy tests
- 1<sup>st</sup> trimester limited obstetric ultrasounds
- Pregnancy options education
- STD testing/treatment for syphilis and chlamydia
- Prenatal vitamins
- Referrals for prolife obstetric care and abortion-pill reversal

## How Does EPS Help Moms in Need?

#### Life Services

Location: 3161 N. 93<sup>rd</sup> St., Omaha, in Catholic Charities St. Teresa Campus

- Free professional counseling/behavioral health services provided by statelicensed mental health providers
- Mom and baby items (clothing, equipment, diapers, formula)through EPS Boutique
- Parenting and life skills classes, both online and in person
- Community Connections/Case Management to connect moms and families with EPS and values-aligned community resources
- Food pantry partnership with Catholic Charities
- One-time financial assistance

### Proposed Parish Responses

- Create guidelines for those whom a person with an unplanned pregnancy might encounter if they walk in the door and need help or have questions. (Parish Staffs, etc.)
- First: be kind and reassuring!! Live Mercy!!!! How can I help?
- Women need compassion, not judgment, when they walk into a church setting.
- Things like "thank you for coming to us." can go a long way to building good relationships. Refer them to the parish leader. Call EPS when they are there. Get their information, so the parish leader can call, and we can follow-up in the future.

### Proposed Parish Responses

- Create a list of guidelines for all parish leaders.
- Parish Leaders need to be the initial point of contact for services.
- Be kind and reassuring. Be welcoming and we can tell you how to do the rest. Questions to ask like, "what is your most immediate need?"
- Resources to have. What can we offer?
- People to call for resources. EPS, Mater Filias, Bethlehem House, Sancta Familia Medical, St. Paul VI Institute, Catholic Charities, etc.



### Proposed Parish Responses

Above all: Keep it simple. No one should be overwhelmed.

 Try to get it down to one phone call. This should not be an overwhelming ministry for one couple or person. Leaders can call EPS's Community Connections Coordinator, who will then meet with the women to access their needs. This person is like a Case Management Director.
